Hello Town of Neenah!

Well we finally made it to the outdoor entertainment time of the year we all enjoy. Kids are out of school, people are out and about doing their favorite outdoor activities, and all in all enjoying the “ambiance & character” of our town. Along with being outside more frequently, we once again notice things that give

us pause to ask questions about neighborhood annoyances and nuisance issues.

The Town of Neenah has been ever evolving from a gentle agricultural setting to quite, close by neighborhoods, of young and old families and life styles. And we all are entitled to our own life style. However, I and your town Board Supervisors, town Administrator/Clerk and Deputy Clerk field questions and stated concerns about A&N issues on a weekly basis. I assure you that “we” have been doing our due diligence in answering these types of questions by referencing our local town ordinances and Winnebago County Planning & Zoning ordinances. Most of, if not all, are qualified at that reference point and if need be we give notice to those for their infraction. For any person or persons who habitually ignore the ordinances we do and have taken court action to correct the situation with fines or cleanup actions that are charged back to the property on their tax role.

Some, but not all, of the perennial concerns are: over grown lawns and perceived weeds, unregistered and/or nonfunctioning vehicles of all types, accumulated debris and garbage outside, dilapidated buildings and

or structures, and dogs. All are easy fixes by considerate property owners.

A golf course manicured type lawn is nice but not an authoritative order. How you enjoy mowing and esthetically maintain your lawn is your call and it has been found help relieve stress. In fact researchers have discovered that a chemical released by a mown lawn makes people feel happy and relaxed. We have Cool-season lawn grasses, like Tall Fescue and Kentucky Bluegrass. Typically, they should be mowed about two times per 7 to 10 days in the spring and fall, and about one time per week during the summer. The Town of Neenah neither advocates nor denounces no mow or slow mow calendar events. I will say however that as a retired Landscape Architect that mowing your lawn too frequently to a table top height is not healthy lawn management. The “one-third rule” states that no more than one-third of the leaf blade should be removed during each mowing. Lawn care professionals will tell you that lawns mowed to a 3” height are healthier than lawns mowed down tighter and more frequently. Plus it allows fewer weeds to invade without using herbicides. Conversely, unless it’s a planned wild flower setting or natural wooded lot, don’t let it become a rogue “Hay Field” with invasive weeds.

Please don’t let your property become a junk yard of unregistered nonfunctioning unsightly vehicles. Having numerous vehicles for family use is understandable. Vehicle customization or restoration can be a popular hobby. But having several just parked there and never moved is quite another. When neighbors protest that your yard is an eyesore when full of inoperable scrap cars; they are not in the wrong. At the very least, if you have one junk vehicle on your

property; this needs to be inside an enclosed structure. This is to stop it from being an eyesore and ensure the safety of everyone in the area.

Piles of debris and garbage are also very unsightly, smell bad, and attract all kinds of varmints and critters. Accumulation of waste on private properties is the gradual gathering of waste due to improper waste management. It is the most visible form of waste pollution. Please dispose of them on a timely basis. Building structures, those that are falling down and deemed uninhabitable, are public health and safety issues. These too need to be addressed before someone gets hurt.

Everyone loves dogs, myself included. You must license your dog by the age of five months, per Wisconsin state law. All dogs are required to be licensed by the 1st of April every year. Your pet's proof of current rabies vaccination and, if applicable, proof of spaying or neutering has to be given at time of license, need to be under control, not allowed to be running at large, and/or excessive barking, and owners need to exercise proper pickup and disposal of feces.

OK Enough.

On the positive side:

Three of our wonderful parks have received or will be getting some much need improvements and additions.

1.) A controlled prairie burn at Conservancy Park to allow the prairie wild flowers and grasses to flourish was successfully completed. By doing so, the park board will continue to work with Lakeview School to, as Park Board Chairman Tom Jankowski states; "Help our Future Naturalists". He has also personally built a floating turtle island for turtles to sun themselves. Stop by and take a look.

2.) Mahler Park parking lot will be completely repaved and stripped this year. This will be scheduled to not interfere with soccer/baseball activities nor functions booked for the pavilion. For safety and traffic control please remember there is "No Parking" along South Park Ave from Bell Street all the way to Commercial Street.

3.) A permanent Restroom facility will be installed at Keating Park. It will include two ADA compliant spaces and a utility room. Concrete walkways around the building with a slab off the front of the structure for picnic tables including an open air overhead Ramada.

Our town hall main meeting room, storage areas, and kitchenette facilities have been architecturally redesigned and will given some much needed renovations to accommodate larger facility occupancy, town board facilitation, election day voter circulation, and rental opportunities. The town hall parking lot will be also completely repaved to include the concrete receiving area for the fire department.

SUPERVISOR'S INSIGHT

Town Board Approves ARPA-Funded Projects

Recently, the town board approved a resolution to use a portion of the ARPA funds awarded to the Town of Neenah. ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act of 2021) funds is the money the federal government provided to state and local governments as part of Covid 19 relief efforts. Although what the money can be used for is broad, there are specific restrictions on the uses that include:

- 1) Funds allocated to states cannot be used directly or indirectly to offset tax reductions or delay a tax or tax increase;
- 2) Funds cannot be deposited into any pension fund.

Since the funds are non-recurring, it is recommended that they not be used for creating new programs that require ongoing funding in the future. Additionally, how the Town's funds are to be used must be determined by the end of 2024 and spent by the end of 2026.

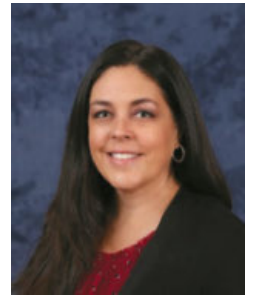
The Town of Neenah was awarded \$369,166 in ARPA funds. Additionally, the Winnebago County Board

approved a resolution in March to equally distribute a portion of the ARPA funds they received to each municipality in Winnebago County. The Town is expected to receive \$145,000 of that allocation.

The board met over the last several months to brainstorm, narrow down and determine how to best use the funds.

Examples of ideas that were discussed included new playground equipment and putting the money towards the Larsen Rd. improvement project or a new fire truck.

At the time this article was written, the town board approved a resolution to use \$162,535 of the funds to add a restroom at Keating Park. The new structure will include a restroom, storage and small overhang for a covered seating area. The park is 6.3 acres and is located at 128 Klompen Ct. It features a baseball diamond, playground and wooded area with walking

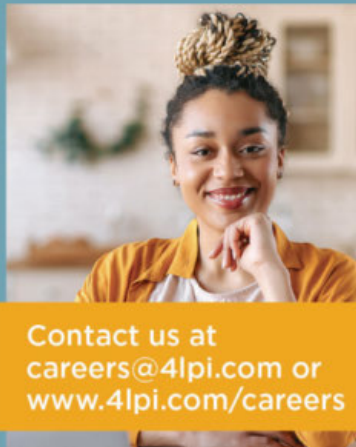

trail. Currently, a portable restroom is placed in the park so the new and improved facilities will be a great addition for everyone!

The board also approved a resolution to spend \$204,700 of the funds on remodeling parts of the Town Hall. Improvements include replacing the HVAC and air exchange system, as well as expanding the meeting room and updating the kitchen area to make it more accessible for people who may rent the Town Hall

for an event. The larger meeting room will allow more space for larger meetings and election days.

Additional discussions and brainstorming will be had to determine how to use the remaining \$146,931 of the ARPA funding.

TOWN OF NEENAH SANITARY DISTRICT #2

The Town of Neenah Sanitary District 2 operates and maintains nine municipal lift stations within the district's collection system. There are multiple elements to collection systems; however, these lift stations serve as the fundamental structures and equipment for conveying wastewater from the district to the wastewater treatment plant.

As portions of the district's collection system and equipment have reached 30+ years of service, the replacement of these items continues to be necessary to maintain reliable sewer service to residents and sewer users.

Last fall, a replacement project began at Lift Station 3, located at 1650 South Park Avenue. As of this writing, only several items remain, and will be completed as the weather moderates.

This location is one of the district's two "main" lift stations. A similar replacement project was completed at Lift Station 2, (441 Rainbow Beach Road) in 2019. These two stations not only receive sewer flow from the surrounding homes, they both also receive flow

from two surrounding lift stations. At these two points, the effluent flow is metered and sampled.

The prior in-ground structure housed the backup generator and transfer switch, transformer, flow meter, and sampler. The control cabinet for the pumps was mounted outside on top of the wet well. The focus of the project was to address several concerns; eliminate the wooden utility pole and multiple guywires and anchors, replace the original obsolete backup generator and transfer switch, install the replacement control panel indoors, and provide for at-grade accessibility for better means of operation and maintenance of the equipment.

The materials used in the construction of the new 11' x 18' structure will provide years of low maintenance service.

PARKS AND TRAILS COMMITTEE

As the chair for the Town of Neenah Park and Trails Committee (TNPTC), I want to be sure that we are communicating well, being good financial stewards of taxpayer dollars, and improving the park and trail experience for everyone.

Over the past few months, the TNPTC has taken steps to look at overall playground plans for all of the town parks. This master plan includes: Types of playground equipment, safety, right mix and location of equipment, ADA accessibility, and having a great child/parent playground experience.

We have also taken first steps for reforestation of our parks with diversified species. Emerald Ash Borer has taken its toll, and Maple diseases are on our doorstep in the Southern United States. We are working with DNR Forestry on evaluation/planning for sustainable tree replacement. This is a legacy project that will ensure a great park experience for many generations into the future.

We continue to work with other groups in the Fox Valley for connecting trails for bikers, walkers, and runners. Safety and user experience are drivers of these projects.

Improving the experience includes the potential placement of restroom facilities at Keating Park, improving roadways with bike lanes, bike repair stations, benches with trees, and connecting our parks within the trail system.

The TNPTC has taken on the task of building our parks and trails on a 2, 5 and 10 year period with a master template or plan.

This brings us to YOU...The Town Resident! We need your suggestions, help in purchasing trees, benches, and other legacy donations for our larger projects like restrooms and playground equipment.

Most of all I want to hear your voice on what you want the town parks and trails to be in the coming years. How are we doing? How can we improve?

I am volunteering for you, our families, and our legacy!

Building permits allow the Town to ensure that construction and renovation work is completed in accordance with local codes and ordinances. Not all projects require a permit; whether or not you need one can depend on the location, size and scope of the work being done. If you're not sure whether your project requires a permit or not, check Town of Neenah website under Departments / Building Inspector. Many projects will also require a Winnebago County Zoning permit, see the Winnebago County Planning and Zoning website for additional information.



TOWN OF NEENAH FIRE DEPARTMENT

Fire Department Required Training

Each Firefighter will complete 120 hours of both classroom and hands-on practical training to become certified as a Firefighter 1. This training prepares each firefighter to operate in what we call the "Hot Zone" or inside a burning structure. Over 90% of the members of the department have continued their training to reach Firefighter II level certification. Apparatus Drivers and Operators must also complete stringent driver training before they get behind the wheel of a department vehicle. Again, all of this training comes with a significant amount of dedication by each firefighter sacrificing many hours of their free time to improve their present skills and learn new ones. The department also has a number of individuals with advanced training in leadership as Fire Officers and Fire Instructors. All of these classes are offered through Fox Valley Technical College, and are paid for by the State of Wisconsin.

Continued Training

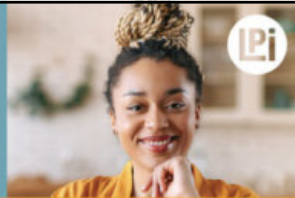
In addition to responding to calls for service, our staff meets every Wednesday evening throughout the year, working to maintain their firefighting and emergency medical skills. These EMS skills cover a wide variety of subjects ranging from treating serious trauma and fractures to a wide variety of illnesses, seizures, strokes, heart attacks, and cardiac arrest. Keeping these skills current is required under State of Wisconsin statutes and is critical to providing life-saving care as quickly as possible. The firefighters also spend time weekly, inspecting, and testing both their firefighting and EMS equipment to be sure that everything is ready to go at a moment's notice. Several Certified Emergency Services Instructors are members of the department and use their experience and training to foster safe and efficient operations on the fireground or at accident scenes. Each December, the entire department conducts ice rescue training and practices in the icy water to be sure their shore-based ice rescue skills are sharp when ice starts to form on Lake Winnebago, the CB quarry, and on the various retention ponds throughout the Town.

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A gorgeous home landscape doesn't need to come at the price of clean lakes and streams. We can have both. But to make it happen, we all need to think a little differently. Read these tips. Post this sheet in your garage near the lawnmower and garden tools. This will help us change one habit at a time, so we have good fishing, swimming, paddling and waterskiing when the work is done.

MOWING

Mow often, when the grass is 3.5 inches or shorter. Set your mower blade at 2.5 inches and let cuttings fall. Cuttings keep the soil moist and restore nutrients over time. Any mower works, but a mulching mower shreds grass finely, so you don't have to be as careful about grass height.

A healthy, mulched lawn outcompetes weeds for light, nutrients, and water. In areas where it's hot, consider prairie grasses or wild flowers instead of turf grass.

Make an effort not to blow cuttings onto pavement. If you do, sweep them up, then lay them around the roots of shrubs or vegetable plants where they help retain moisture.

If grass gets long and you decide to collect clippings, put them in a pile with other yard waste and let them decompose. Turn the pile now and

then, and in 3-6 months you'll have rich organic matter that will make almost anything in your yard grow better.

FERTILIZING & WEED CONTROL

Chemicals and weed killers are not needed for a healthy lawn, and they're one of the main reasons we have green algae in our lakes and streams.

Think before you buy. Get a soil test so you know if your lawn needs more nutrients. Mulch to keep the lawn healthy, so it can outcompete weeds for light, nutrients and water. If you must fertilize, do it in the fall. Sweep up fertilizer that falls in the street and dispose of it properly—water and fertilizer that go into the street go directly to the river or lake.

WATERING

When watering is needed, use a sprinkler that shoots low to the ground. Sprinkle soil, not the street. Shape soil so water will sink in, rather than run off. When you mow, mulch cuttings to retain moisture.

Stormwater is rain or snowmelt and water from things people do, like overwatering the lawn or letting fertilizer fall into the street drain. We can choose products carefully and shape our lawns and pavement so water sinks in. When we do, runoff is reduced, pollutants filter out and streams and groundwater are protected.

Untreated runoff is the biggest threat to our nation's water quality, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Let's make the small, important changes that will reduce that threat and improve water quality and our lives!

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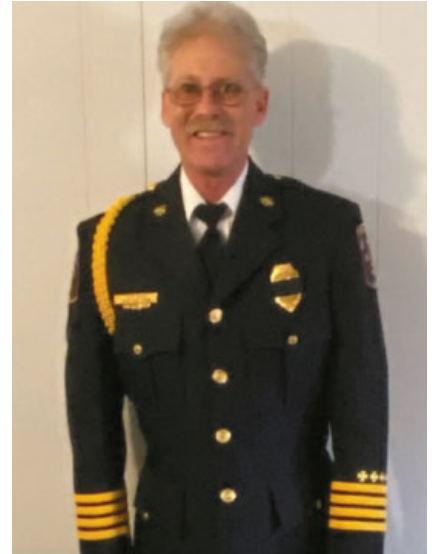
FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

- ⇒ Installing a Swimming Pool? Contact Winnebago County Zoning for a permit
- ⇒ Building a Deck, Garage Shed or other Accessory Building? Contact Winnebago County Zoning for Zoning Permit and Town of Neenah Building Inspector for a Building Permit
- ⇒ Remodeling? Contact Town of Neenah Building Inspector for a permit.
- ⇒ Electrical and plumbing work may require a permit contact Town of Neenah Building Inspector

- **2023 RECYCLING CALENDAR MAGNETS** are available in the Town Office.
- **YARD SIGNS:** Yard signs are NOT permitted in any Town Road right-of-way, including advertisements and political signs.
- **PETS IN TOWN PARKS:** No animals or pets other than leashed dogs are allowed in Town parks. Dogs owners are required to immediately pick up and dispose of excrement on Town park property or adjacent to Town park property.
- **ROAD RIGHT-OF-WAY WORK:** Work in the Town road right-of-way (other than mowing) must be permitted through the Clerk's office prior to any work being performed.
- **BURNING:** Remember burning is permitted in the Town as set forth in Ordinance 5.05. Be respectful of your neighbors when burning. Contact Winnebago County Sheriff before and after burning (920)236-7300 #0 to avoid false alarms.
